Argentina (S.A) – ← DanDan

- Activity: Farming and planting
 - Materials needed: Planting Materials
 - Spoil to plant flowers in cups.
 - Talk to DanDan. He will come in the morning to set up this station but will not stay for the whole time.
 - Teva Garden next to Moadon
 - Why? Because when Eastern European Jews first came to Argentina in the late 19th-early 20th centuries, they were farmers. (gauchos)

Mexico (N.A),

- Activity: Mural Painting
 - Materials needed: Big sheet of “butcher” paper, paints, paint brushes
 - Contact Omanut for all of the above
 - Outside Moadon Ilanot (Rain plan: Inside moadon)
 - Why? Because one of Mexico’s famous artists, Diego Rivera traces himself back to Jews.
 - Talk about the inquisition, conversos, and how some people had to hide their identity and Judaism in order to live.

Italy (Eu),

- Activity: Make your own Italian Food! (Pizza) in groups. Each group of 10/11 people will make two pizzas in the group. Pizzas will be served at lunch but should not be used as a substitute for pack-out.
 - Materials needed: dough, cheese, sauce, (vegetables), some bowls, cookie trays (to put in the oven)
 - Talk to Randy Bergel. Everything that she doesn’t have needs to be bought at Wal Mart.
 - Work outside, then bake Pizzas in Moadon Tzevet
 - Why? Because Italians eat Pizza...Jewish Italians do too!

China (Asia),

- Activity: Who can build the tallest “Great” wall in the time allotted?
 - Materials needed: Shoe Boxes/ Other boxes
 - Ask Walmart if they have anything they can give us.
 - Migrash. No room needed
 - Why? Because there were Jews in China in the time that the great wall was built. Some Jews may have even helped build the Great Wall!

Ethopia (Africa),

- Activity: "Escape to Israel" obstacle course
 - Materials needed: Random Benches and other things we can find around camp that can be used in an obstacle course.
 - Nothing needs to be bought. Counselors will locate materials
 - Preferably use Lower Migrash
 - Why? Because when the Ethiopian Jews escaped to Israel, they had to go secretly on Operation Moses and Operation Solomon. Sometimes the Jews would walk across the desert for days just to get to a crowded plane that could take them to Israel.

Counselor Instructions Argentina

Before you begin the activity:

- Ask your campers if they know anything about Argentina.
 - Where is Argentina?
 - What Continent?
 - What Language do they speak there?
- Show map and point out Argentina
- Share the following facts with the campers
 - Jews first came to Argentina after during the Spanish Inquisition in 1492.
 - Ask: Does anyone know what the Spanish Inquisition was?
 - Answer: In 1492, King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella from Spain ordered that all Jews had to either convert to Christianity, leave Spain or be killed. To escape, many Jews went to Argentina.
 - Once the Jews got to Argentina, many of them became farmers or gauchos. (Show picture of gaucho)
 - Today, there is a large Jewish community in Argentina much like the one in America.
 - Ask: What kinds of things does the Jewish community in America have
 - Sample answer: Jewish Day Schools—the majority of Jewish kids in Argentina go to Jewish day school.

Activity: Planting like a Jewish Gaucho

Every camper will receive their own Argentinean plantation (represented by plastic cup). They will fill it with soil, plant a seed and pour some water into the cup. The campers will keep their cup on the porch of their bunk over the next few weeks and watch the plant grow! **Important: Please write each camper's name and bunk on the cups.**

Counselor Instructions Mexico

Before you begin the activity:

- Ask your campers if they know anything about Mexico
 - Where is Mexico
 - What Continent?
 - What Language do they speak there?
- Show map and point out Mexico
- Share the following facts with the campers

MEXICO

Conversos

-When Hernando Cortes conquered the Aztecs in 1521, he was accompanied by several Conversos, (Jews forcibly converted to Christianity during the Inquisition of 1492.)

-In spite of the Inquisition, the Conversos attempted to lead Jewish lives by circumcising their children and keeping kosher. From 1528 on, Conversos were punished for their practices by being burned at the stake. Over the course of the colonial period, about 1500 were convicted.

-The Conversos assimilated in the 19th century, and descendants of the Conversos are often devout Catholic families that light candles on Friday nights, keep meat and dairy separate, and close their businesses on Saturdays.

Today In Mexico

-Around 40,000 Jews live in Mexico

-majority live in the capital, Mexico City.

-in Mexico City, there are over 30 synagogues, most of them Orthodox. 80-90% of Jewish children in Mexico City attend a Jewish school.

-Throughout all of Mexico, 95 percent of Jewish families belong to a synagogue. Only about 1 out of every 10 Mexican Jews intermarries.

ACTIVITY

Mural in the style of Diego Rivera

There will be one “plaster” (large piece of paper) for the entire day. Campers will use paintbrushes and/or fingers to make a mural. The mural will be generally outlined, but the campers will be able to improvise as much as they would like.

Before you begin the activity, explain the following:

Diego Rivera is one of the greatest Mexican artists. Although he is not *a practicing Jew*, his mother was Jewish and he says that his Judaism was one of the most defining parts of his life, even though he did not practice.

- Today, we will be making a Fresco! **Frescoes** are mural paintings done on fresh plaster. Using the fresco form in universities and other public buildings, Rivera was able to introduce his work into the everyday lives of the people.

Counselor Instructions Italy

Before you begin the activity:

- Ask your campers if they know anything about Italy.
 - Where is Italy?
 - What Continent?
 - What Language do they speak there?
- Show map and point out Italy
- Share the following facts with the campers

Activity: Making Kosher Pizza like an Italian Jew

Important: Purell and Hand Washing must take place before beginning this activity. The counselor in charge must pay careful attention to campers touching the pizza after coughing/sneezing etc. Feel free to make campers wash their hands multiple times during the activity! Have a purell bottle on hand.

Split the group into two smaller groups. Each group will make one Pizza.

Each group will receive: a lump of dough, a bowl of sauce, and a bowl of cheese.

Campers should make the dough into a flat piece, then spread sauce and cheese as much as desired. Campers will then place their finished pizza on a tray and the counselors will put the tray in the moadon tzevet oven after the activity has finished.
